The Grade 9 Program Model

Techsploration is a mentor-led experiential learning program that empowers young women and gender diverse youth to explore careers in Science, Engineering, Technology and the Trades. The grade 9 program uses the following base program model:

Step 1

Create a Team

Each participating school forms a Techsploration Team of up to 8 female and gender diverse students in grade 9, led by two teachers.

Step 2

Team Role Model Matching

Each team is matched with a "team role model" - a female or gender diverse individual working in a STEM or trades field.

Step 3

Research & Safety Training

Teams research their role model's career, and complete online safety training.

Step 4

Techsploration Goes to Work

Teams visit their role model's workplace to learn more about the career (and role model!) first hand, often meeting other female+ STEM/trades employees at the same time!

Step 5

Techsploration Goes to School

Teams spend several weeks/months creating a presentation about their role model's career. They deliver their presentation at school as a trial run, and use feedback from that to further refine their presentation.

Step 6

Techsplorer Event

Each team attends one of three regional Techsplorer Events - 1.5 day conferences where students engage with dozens of female+ role models, hear from inspiring speakers, take part in workshops, and deliver their presentations as part of a friendly competition.

What an incredible season for the grade 9 program!

Nearly **200 female and gender diverse students took part in the program** - building confidence, developing critical soft skills, learning about careers and career pathways into science, engineering, technology and trades sectors, and engaging directly with dozens of female and gender diverse role models working in these fields. Students left feeling empowered, and eager to continue challenging outdated stereotypes around gender and career!

Techsploration Goes to Work

February - April

Students took part in worksite visits across the province at places like Bird Construction, Nova Scotia Power, and Irving Shipbuilding. During the visits students got to learn about their role model's career and career path, and often met other female+ employees working in STEM and trades as part of the visit!

Techsploration Goes to School • February - April

Following the worksite visits, teams met regularly at their school to create a presentation highlighting their role model's career - typically a combination of a Powerpoint and something interactive, like a skit. They delivered a "dry run" of the presentation at school, using the feedback they received to further strengthen and refine their work.

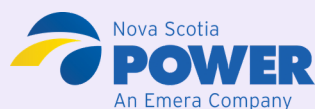
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
